After the publication of University results, a subject wise analysis of the result is carried out in the staff meeting chaired by the Principal, and appropriate measurs are taken for improving the performance of the students in the running session.

- How are teachers recruited? When and how are new teaching positions created? Give details.
 - * The teachers are recruited by the management as per the rules of the Nagpur University and the Govt. of Maharastra. Every year depending upon the available work load subject wise assessment of the required staff is done by the office of the Joint Director, Higher Education, and assessment memo is forwarded to each college indicating therein the number of subject wise vacant posts. The college then takes the permission of special cell constituted in the University as per directions of UGC the special cell assigns the category wise reservation if any to the post. Depending upon the exsiting policy,

permission is to be obtain from Joint Director/Director for filling the posts. After due pemission the post are advertised in two national dailies and the University is requestred to communicate the names of selection committee in the concerned subjects. The sellection committee as per the rules of UGC and the Govt. of Maharastra consist of 1) Chairman of the L.M.C. or his nominee, 2) One expert nominated by Vice-Chancellors, 3) One experts nominated by the Management Council, 4) One nominee of the Director of Education (H.E.), 5) University subject expert, 6) Principal of the college, 7) The Head of the Department concerned of the college. The selection committee interviews the candidates and submits its reports indicating the list of selected candidates in the order of merit. The name of the candidates in the first place is communicated to the University with relevent documents and the approval is obtained from the University which is followed by the issuing of appointment order.

*New teaching positions are created depending upon i) Increase in the number of divisions, ii) The resignation of exsiting staff, iii) Termination of any teacher, iv) Superannuation of any teacher. The pemission of University and Govt. Of Maharastra is obtained for filling the vacant posts.





PREFACE-

The essence of education is to transform the backward society into an advanced one By initiating Social, Cultural, Scientific, Economic and Technological development.

The Dandakaranya Educational, Cultural and Research Development Society is well reputed education Institute of the region, founded in 1972.

To provide the education for most backward tribal students of the area, the institution was formed by well educated group of the District. Mr. G. N. Munghate was founder President of the Society. Principal of the college, senior professors of the college are the member of the society.

For the remarkable contribution in the field of education for the backward and tribal people of the area The Institute was awarded by the Government of Maharastra. The Institute received 'Best Institution Awards' by Govt. of Maharastra worth 1 lack Rupees. Among Six other prize winner institutions. This institution was one of them through out whole Maharastra and second in Vidarbha region.

The Institution also received 'Adiwasi Sewa Sanstha Award' by Govt. of Maharastra.

The college was opened by the society in 1990, to provide the opportunity of higher education for the most backward and tribal students of Kurkheda area...

In the beginning the college was started in small rental building but in a short span of Time the institute provide 2acre land and well equipped building of the college just 2 k.m. away from Kurkheda in the natural surrounding. The building of the is central attraction for the villagers

The Dandakaranya Education Society was aware that the real education includes the Attempts to create the scope for all round development and the real education includes the attempts to create the scope for the all round development of the students. The newly set up college was wanting on many counts. The tribal, rural surroundings, scarcity of funds and resources and lack of necessary infrastructure were few of many problems that beset the path of the college at the very outset of its journey. However the Dandakaranya Education Society, comprising mostly of people belongs to educational field (Teaching community) was sure that its noble mission would be reciprocated by the co-operation and generosity of the people in Kurkheda area.

Today the independent building of our college stands in 2 acres of land amidst natural surroundings. Higher education in India is becoming a privilege of only those who can spend huge amount of money. Considering the fact College has provided the good opportunity not only of higher education but at same time providing the scope for all round development of our students committed to the harmonious and all round development of the young boys and girls, the college constantly

endeavors towards character building, developing love for learning and Indian culture, nationalism and secularism.

Though the college is settle in very backward and tribal area but this small college have rich linkage with Inter- National and National Organizations. Research project on Tobacco Chewing among students and Environment Awareness Project are all these prominent and prideful achievements of the small college.

The college received 'Gold Star Award ' by International Business Council, New Delhi for its contribution in the field of Environment Awareness.

Principal R. G. Munghate received ' Jewel of India Prize' from the same Institution., for his contribution in the field of environment awareness.

In the very small span of 13 year the college tried its level best to uplift the standard of the education and tried to provide education to the tribal students.

But the colleges have the limitations and without such obstacles no one can move forward successfully.

It is felt that the college has not grown to its full potential mainly due to its rural setting.

We have limitations to start new courses due to the wrong policy of State Govt.

The decision of the NAAC to access and accredit the institutes of higher education for the purpose of quality up gradation at such a time seems highly significant. It gives immense satisfaction that the apex body of education in our country is more worried about quality education that any thing else. The college has taken this move as an opportunity for it to reflect upon its strength and weakness, and to know itself better.

The college has tried to prepare the self-study report according to the parameters given by the NAAC, with almost sincerity and objectivity. The exercise of writing self-study report has been a trying and tiring one. The steering committee started this task as a matter of compulsion to meet the requirement of the NAAC for the assessment and accreditation of the college but gradually it became a very absorbing process of self-introspection. It was just like writing a diary of the college. The NAAC has provided the college a wonderful opportunity to know and understand itself better.

The Principal of the college constituted an eight members steering committee of its staff. The college have small group of teaching staff so all teachers are joined as the members of steering committee. All the member of this committee worked together during entire process of the collection of the data on the various aspects. The committee has tried its best to involve as many individuals and groups in this process as could be Possible. In particular, view & opinions of all the teachers, non-teaching staff, students, parents and some alumni has been sought and incorporated in the preparation of the self-study report.

Our college, with good academic record and extra curricular activities has also been maintaining acceptable level of educational standards. In fact, a rigorous process of evaluation by an outside body enables us to understand ourselves better and to attain that which is required for rising to the expectation and demands of the accreditation council. Enhancing our responsibility, accountability and more importantly, instructional standards has not only been a matter of privilege but also a constant concern for all our staff members. We strongly believe, that in the competitive word of higher education top most priority should be given to qualification consideration

The steering committee held some meeting of its own members to deliberate on the various aspects of the institutions and discuss threadbare among themselves each point of the seven criteria identified by the NAAC. The part I of the report consist of the data of our college under the major criteria and also the inputs form all the departments, for assessment as per the frame-work suggested by NAAC. Part II of the self-study report consist of the self-analysis of the college that is based on the data collected in part I.

The present report is an out come of the collective endeavor and deep contemplation of the self-study team to make an objective assessment of the institution. Along with this report we have attached supporting documents, wherever necessary.

CURRICULAR ASPECTS

Ours is a rural college that runs graduation level classes in Arts in B.A. programme we offer choice of seven subjects that cater to the demands of students in this area.

Being an affiliated college, it doesn't enjoy any liberty to design the curriculum for its students. The college is bound to follow the curriculum designed by the various bodies of the University. The college teachers do get some opportunities to play an active role in this role curriculum design when they are elected/nominated as members of various University bodies.

The college follows the syllabi of various subjects framed by the Nagpur University Nagpur that is prepared according to the guidelines of UGC, New Delhi. At present one member of our faculty represent the Board of Studies of Nagpur University and thus have a hand in designing the curriculum.

In the Nagpur University there are near about 35 subjects available for the B.A. Programme Our College has included seven subjects out of that long list for B.A. in accordance to the immediate requirements of the students in our area. We are aware that addition of few more optional subjects like Music, Public administration, Communicative English, Home Economics, English Literature, would be of great benefit to our students. But lack of finance and infrastructure hampers our movements in that direction.

In our area there is no provision of education in Commerce Faculty, in high school or in Junior College level. As result we cannot open the Commerce Faculty.

There are many short-term diploma and certificate courses available in the University that could enrich the educational experience of the students studying for the Bachelor's Degree. With that view we had started center Computer education; which misfired due to lack of response from student's community.

The economical weakness of our students and financial constraints of the institution, Governments financial policies which are the main obstacles in improving the curricular aspects of our college. Our college has recently submitted the proposal for 2 f and the college will acquire 12 B recognition from the UGC very soon. And we hope to remove the above stated obstacles with the help of UGC schemes and aids, and develop the college in desired direction.

Criteria- II :-

TEACHING & LEARNING

Our college is based in rural surrounding and hence we can't expect too much brilliant students. So we have to be flexible in the admission procedure. However students with good academic record are given priority. Few seats are kept reserve till the last date of admission so that the students with good academic record, who approach after trying for other courses like D.Ed, ITI, and B.Ed. etc., get admission.

The new session normally starts in June every year. The college publishes its prospectus well before the admission dates. It contains all information about the programmes of study available, rules and regulation governing admission and also fee structure.

The admission committee comprising of teaching is formed and it look after the admission procedure. The students selected for the programmes according to their percentage in qualifying examination. The committee is also empowered to personally interview the students, if necessary.

The provisional time-table is published on the notice board immediately after the commencement of the session. The regular time-table is published and brought in effect, after fifteen days. In the beginning of the session a meeting of the teaching staff is called by the principal, in whom the subject wise performance of the student of university examination is reviewed and various measures are discussed for further improvement of the faculty in charge. The HOD's are encouraged to discuss periodically the development in class room with others teachers of the department.

There is no denying the fact that most of the teachers of the college generally follow the traditional lecture method. The quiz method is adopted, particularly for teaching grammar in the English class. The use of the black board, charts, models and maps is also a common practice.

The subject clubs arrange various activities like debates, group-discussion, and guest lectures. That broadens the process of learning of particular subject. In addition to the question-answer method adopted by the teachers in the class, unit test, mid-term test is also conducted by the college examination committee to determine the level of the students and appropriate remedial measures are taken to redress the deficiencies.

The committee feels that the institution is certainly being served by really good teachers who are committed to the all round development of our rural students. The teachers regularly participate in workshops, seminars, refresher courses, orientation courses, conferences with a view to acquaint themselves with the new trends in education, so that they can mould their students according to the latest standards.

The college monitors the performance of the teaching staff through the self-appraisal forms and annual confidential reports (ACR) filled up and submitted by all the teachers every year. The principal examines those forms and gives suggestion regarding the improvement of their competency in the field of teaching, research and extension. The Principal also observes the classroom teaching

and offer the teachers useful suggestion to improve performance. The students feedback on classroom teaching through structured proforma has been introduced with a view to upgrade the teaching standards of our faculty.

Criteria - III

REASERCH CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

As the college is still in the early stages of growth there is not much facility for research work. . In the teaching staff one member is doing his research work for PhD degree.

The college staff is now preparing for the research work. The Management and the Principal always encourage the teaching staff to undertake active research work. Some teachers improved their qualifications and secured their M.Phil. Degrees.

At present all the faculty members are engaged in the preparation for National Eligibility Test.(NET) as well as the preparation for their research work.

The college have Environment Awareness Project, supported by Environment & Forest Ministry of the Govt. of India. From last 3 years the college is engaged with this project. The grant of 5000 Rs received for the implementation of the programmer. The project like Campus Diversity, Women Rights Awareness, Personality Development and Sex Education for the women, Workshops for of the Co-Operative Education organized by District Co-Operative Organizations. These are some major activities of extension programme of the college. The tremendous enthusiasm and full support of the students and of all faculty members—makes the success in all activities. Even the positive response of ex-students and the parents of the students contributes positive support.

The collaboration of various Organizations supports the college for strengthening the positive attitude towards the betterment of backward and tribal people of the region . The small college of us always ready to engage in various innovative project.

The Research Project on the habit of tobacco chewing of our college students is remarkable achievement of our small college. Today the name of our college is connected with the name of prominent Research Organizations like, Rockefeller Foundation America, and Tata Institute of Social Science, Mumbai. All these research project are not only the matter of pride for our students and staff but also it is the matter of the pride for the people of whole area.

The N.S.S Unit, Women's Study Center Unit and Adult Education Committee govern the extension activities. These units organize blood donation and medical check up camps, tree-plantation and cleanliness programmes, literacy and awareness campaigns for the welfare of the society. The college also invites the academic peers from nearby centers for extension lectures.

The college is not only the center for higher education for the tribal area of the kurkheda but it is the center for the cultural and social activities. It is the future plan of the college to make the college the center for the research in the field of community health and agriculture.

Criteria - IV :-

INFRASTRUCTURE & LEARNING REASOURCES

The independent building of our college stands in two acres of land amidst natural surroundings. The entire college is sufficiently equipped with furniture and electrical fittings. There is small but beautiful garden is the attraction not only of the students of the college but also of the peoples of area.

Books are important source of knowledge for teachers and students. In view of that our constant endeavor has been to enrich the college library. At present the library has valuable collection of text books, reference book, encyclopedia, dictionaries, atlas, gazetteers, research journals etc. Apart from our teachers and students, the local residents are taking the benefit of the rich stock of reading material available in our library. An exhibition of the books in our library was organized in this session on 15th January 2003 with a view to acquaint the students with the variety of books available and to arouse their interest in reading. Our college librarian engages a special library orientation class in the beginning of every session in order to train the fresh students as to how to use the library effectively for enriching their intellectual capacity. The automation of library will be completed very soon..

The recent addition of well-equipped gymnasium is our one more step in the direction of providing scope for over-all development of our rural students. The gymnasium facility is allowed to be used by the outsiders on request in writing.

The Multipurpose Hall is major availability of the college. All the functions are to be held in the hall. For the extra classes, coaching classes also the hall is utilize. The hall is well equipped with the sound system.

The College have 2 well structured Buildings in the premises of the college. The main building is consist of classrooms, Multipurpose Hall, Library, reading room, and second building consist of Gymnasium ,Staff Room, Girls room ,Physical Education Department Room, NSS Department Room.

However the College Management feels that the addition of some more infrastructure facilities will lend a sense of growth and a step towards perfection. A computer center, a guest house, hostel, vehicle parking shed are some of the major requirements of the college at present. The college definitely wishes and plans to add these facilities to its infrastructure but the financial constraints do not permit it to move in this direction smoothly.

Special attention is paid to the maintenance of the existing infrastructure. The furniture verification committee and the construction and maintenance committee have been formed with that view.

Criteria - V :-

STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

The college tries its best to provide overall healthy environment for its students. Various scholarship received from the government are disbursed very year to the students belonging to SC/ST/NT categories. The bright students also given National and State Merit Scholarships. The college has a career guidance bureau to guide the students about various competitive exams and job opportunities. The college provides ample opportunities to the students for all-round personality development.

Mid-term examination and Modern Test examination are effective means for collection of students' feedback, which helps the college to understand and meet their needs and aspirations.

Regular meetings of the staff members act as multi-purpose platforms for the students to hear their grievances to exhibit their talents and seek guidance regarding their problem.

The students' organizations functioning in the campus and the students' council formed in the college every year are important vehicles for receiving feedback for the students. This year we introduced teacher's evaluation by students by providing them structured questionnaire. The Reader's Club formed under the auspices of Library Committee of the college conducted a survey of the students to know their opinions about the conditions and facilities existing in the college. There is a Students Guidance and Grievance Committee comprising of teachers that hears and tries to solve the complaints of the students.

Alumni Association has been formed in our college in the year 2002 with the object of involving the past students in the future progress of our college.

The college magazine 'Mrudgandha' published every year, provides the students an opportunity to develop their skill of expression.

Various cultural activities like debates, elocution competitions, essay writing competitions etc are organized for promoting all-round development of our students.

To sum up, our college constantly endeavors to provide scope for the betterment of our students.

Criteria - VI :-

ORGANISATION AND MANAGEMENT

The managing committee of Dandakaranya Education Society looks after the Administration of Vidyabharti Arts College. It controls finance, approves the schemes of development and expansion activities. The management periodically holds meeting with the Principal and Other staff members to enquire about the working of the college and shares its views regarding progress of the college. Despite being the ultimate authority in all matters of governance of the college, the management of the college has no direct interference with day to day functioning for which the Principal of the college leads and runs it with the support and co-operation of the staff member.

The Local Managing Committee (LMC) of the college looks after the day-to-day administration of the institution. LMC has among its members, the President of the society as President of LMC, the Principal as Secretary of LMC and four members from management, three teacher's representatives, three local members working in different areas and one representative from non-teaching staff of the

The college development council is functioning in the college since 2000. The principal is the chairman of this council and one teaching faculty is selected as the secretary for one year and all the teachers in the staff are members of the council.

college. The members of the committee have access to all records and documents of the college.

The meeting of the college development council is called in the beginning of the session in which various committees are formed; the subject wise analysis of University examination result is done; various measures for improvement of college result in future are discussed; the academic calendar is prepared and necessary steps to be taken for improving the overall working of the college in the desired direction are discussed. The various suggestions that come foreword in the meeting are forwarded by the President and Secretary to the management committee.

The college authority, from time to time, makes ad-hoc and temporary appointments of the additional faculty members as per requirements of the college. The teaching staff is encouraged to improve its professional skill by participating in refresher courses, orientation programmes, seminars and workshops Each member of each staff writes his/her self-appraisal report, which is assessed by the principal and duly approved by governing body. The whole system of the college functions in a very democratic and transparent manner with the help of various comities and advisory bodies. The fees and other annual charges are collect from the students' securities according to the rule of the University and State Government. The Principal, the Head Clerk and the governing body do the budget planning of the college. The accounts are regularly audited by the chartered Accountant, and internal auditor of the management and the auditors deputed by the State Government. The college expenses like salary and other expenses are managed out of grant-in-aid received from the Maharashtra Government, grants from the UGC and fees.

Criteria - VII :-

HEALTHY PRACTICES

Our college constantly endeavours to provide quality education that could include development of the intellectual, moral, and social aspects of our students. All our staff members share the above cause and whole-heartedly co-operate in the various activities of the college. The staff appraisal reports and annual confidential reports filled up and submitted by all the teachers annually, help in maintaining the consistency in their performance. These forms provide an opportunity of objective introspection to the teachers so that they can remove their deficiencies and improve their standard.

The various committees like N.S.S. Women's study center, Adult Education, and Cultural committee conduct various activities and programs so as to provide scope for the all-round development of our students. The Death Anniversaries and Birth Anniversaries of all our National leaders are observed by paying floral homage to them and a short lecture is delivered by a staff member to throw light on the life and character of those great personalities.

The achievement of the students in academic field is the greatest 'Gurudhakshina' that a teacher can get. With this view the Teacher's Day is celebrated in our college by felicitating our students who are the top scorers of the college in University Examination.

. This year the college has taken initiative to start GANDHI VICHAR PARICHAY

EXAMINATION center. That would provide an opportunity to our students to study the values and principles of M. Gandhi.

SUMMARY

The college, setting in the most back word tribal area of the state, preparing for its assessment and accreditation by NAAC, is remarkable development of the institute. From last 13 years, the college is facing many problems but with the help of tremendous enthusiasm and positive support of the native peoples, the students the staff members the college is now its bold turn to face the challenge of NACC Committee's.

Our's is small college of single faculty of Arts. The college have proudfull linkage with international National organization. The College have small family of the teaching & non-teaching members; who always keeps themself busy for the overall development of the poor and tribal people of the area.

Though there is limited scope of the subject choice but whatever subjects are available our students are happy with it because college not only provide good education but also always determine to develop the over all personality of the students.

The college have its own internal procedure of evaluation of the students as well of the college staff.

Though the small Arts college can not provide actual research work in the teaching learning process, but various projects of the college provide proper scientific attachment with the reputated organisations, as the college have collaboration with them.



The Habit of Tobacco Chewing Among The College Students And Its Effects on Their Oral Health

INTRODUCTION:

The use of tobacco is widely regarded as the most preventable causes of death in the world. The World Health Organization (WHO) attributes some 4 million deaths a year to tobacco, a figure which is expected to rise to 8.4 million deaths a year by 2020. By this time, 70% of these deaths will be occurring in the developing countries. Studies in the developed countries show that most people begin using tobacco before the age of 18 years, if these patterns continue tobacco use will be result in the death of 250 million of the people who are children and adolescents today many of them in the developing countries. In recent years WHO, UNICEF, and group of 8 Ministers of the Environment. The Ministers Responsible for Youth and many National Health Agencies have called the concerted action against tobacco use by young people. Yet information on tobacco use among young people is not available for most developing countries.

India is the second most populous country in the world and the third largest producer and consumer of Tobacco. The Country has a long history of tobacco use and variety of ways of tobacco use. The death and disease burdens from tobacco use in India are estimated generally from cigarettes smoking, but tobacco chewing is also main reason for disease of oral heath in India.

In India, the earliest observation of the harmful effects of tobacco was made by Niblock (Niblock WJ. Cancer in Indian. Indian Med Coz 1902, 32: 161-165) who observed in 1902 that Cancer of the check accounted for almost one third of all Cancer admissions to a general hospital in the state of Madras (Now in Tamil Nadu). He attributed this to the Tobacco chewing habit.

The Carcinogenic Potential of Tobacco use has been described in other regions of Indian as well Data from the national Cancer Registry Project of the Indian Council of Medical Research (Annual Report 1986, New Delhi, 1989) showed that 50% of all cancer is man and 20% of those among women are tobacco related.

In the Gadchiroli district, which is the most backward district of the Maharashtra. A large variety of tobacco eating are prevalent. Mainly smokeless tobacco use is very common in this area. The small piece of raw or commercially available, finely cut tobacco is taken on the palm and little slaked lime is added, the in gradients are then mixed vigorously with the thumb to make them alkaline and placed in the mouth or inside the lower leaps.

Throughout various camps and dental check up of the students we have the information that most of the college students have the habit of tobacco chewing and it was observed that the oral status of most of the tobacco eaters is poor.

There is a need for data on tobacco eating of the young students . the data will relate to knowledge, awareness and practice to deduce the danger of tobacco eating .

There are many research conducted on the danger of the tobacco eating, ,but there is no research on the habit of the tobacco eating of the college students of this area nor on this particular method of the tobacco eating. More and more research on tobacco are on the smoking the tobacco, so we feel the urgent need of the Tobacco Central Awareness Programme for the college students of the area. The crucial relationship between tobacco use and both oral cancer and precancerous lesions is well accepted everywhere. So the institute decided to begin the tobacco control programme for college students, for it the proper scientific study was required. So to save the life of young generation we undertake this project and it was decided that after having the proper study the action plan strategies will decide.

The Organization -

Vidyabharti Mahavidyalaya, Kurkheda is non government Institute of the higher education, working in the area of the most backward tribal area of Gadchiroli district of Maharastra. The institute is run by Dandakaranya Educational, cultural and social development society ,Gadchiroli. Which is one of the leading organization working for the socio- educational development of the tribal community of the area.

Vidyabharti Mahavidyalaya, Kurkheda is not only working in the field of higher education in tribal area but through various programs and projects the institute is carrying socio-cultural and medical research for the betterments of the local tribal peoples. Along with the provision of higher education, Creating the awareness about environment and health among the tribal students is the main activity of the institute.

The Institute was awarded by Gold Star Award by International Environment Awareness Campaign.

Justification

This is the study on habit of tobacco chewing of the college going students of the tribal area, and the oral check-up of the each target student by the dentist. The learning from this will help the institute in implementing the project of Tobacco Control Programme For Tribal Youth in the tribal area of the Gadchiroli district.

Objectives

- To ascertain the percentage of tobacco chewing among the college students.
- To study the factors influencing the habit of tobacco chewing among the college students.
- 3. To identify the effects of tobacco chewing on their oral health .
- 4. To utilize the findings of the research for the awareness and remedial programme

Scope of the study

The study has been conducted in Vidyabharti Mahavidyabharti, among 175 male college students of age group between 19 to 27 years.

The total numbers of the institute -550, and the target group was 175 students.

Methodology

The data was collected through

- 1. the questionnaire
- Oral Check-up report of the dentist.

The period of Data Collection-

Ouestionnaire-

15th October 2002 to 30th October 2002

Oral Check-up report by the dentist.

2nd November 2002 to 5th November 2002.

Sample size

Total sample size was 175 students.

Sample Selection

Six divisions of undergraduates classes (B.A.) In Vidyabharti Mahavidyalaya Kurkheda ,Distt. Gadchiroli .

One division each from the B.A. Part I, B.A. Part II, and B.A. Part III Classes were selected at random. All students in the selected classes were ask to fill up the questionnaire and ask to go through the oral check-up by dentist.

THE FINDINGS

The study explores the following interesting findings.

The Main Future of the Findings

- In the tribal area of Gadchiroli District 62.4 % College students have the habit of tobacco chewing.
- 58% Students have the habit of tobacco chewing with other methods of the tobacco chewing.
- Those who have more than3 friends the habit of tobacco chewing is founds among them.
- The first introduction to the tobacco chewing among most of the students mainly due to the friends.
- If the student's parents are illiterate the habit of tobacco chewing founded among the students perfectly.
- The students from the farmer's family the habit is founded definitely among them.
- If the parents of the students have the habit of tobacco chewing the same habit is founded 100% in their sons.
- Many students begin eating tobacco just as curiosity but the habit confirmed when they use to eat tobacco as a fun.
- The students from lower income group family definitely founded the habit of tobacco chewing.
- Mother's education or her habit of using tobacco doesn't have any influence on the son
- There is no direct influence of the brother' habit of tobacco using on the student.

But there are 108 students who have more than 2 friends out of which 30 student do not eat, but 78 students eats the tobacco, so the percentage of eating tobacco among those who have more than two friends is 62.9% and statistical significance is .001.

Findings of oral status of students

In the second part of the study the oral examination was conducted by the dentist the report of the dentist follows:

General findings

The medical oral check-up shows that those students who never use tobacco their oral status is 91.2% moderate and only 8% poor. But these students chew tobacco their oral state is 69% moderate and 31% poor.

The problem of resending gums found among those who have the habit, resending gums are founded in 45% students who have the habit, 68 students out of 181 are affected with this problem.

The problem of Discoloration of Mucosa Membrane is found in most of the students who have the habit. The problem of thickening of mucosa is founded in most of the students who have the habit.

Conclusions

- In the tribal area of Gadchiroli 62.4% college students have the habit of tobacco
- Most of the tobacco chewing student have some problem of their oral health
- The friend circle is very much responsible for formulating the habit.
- Fathers occupation, economical condition, literacy status affected the students in formulating the habit.
- Those who have the habit of tobacco chewing the oral status is affected, but those who are not using tobacco, comparably their oral health is better.
- There is a great need for counseling the awareness about the harmful effects of tobacco chewing.

Problem faced and limitation of the study.

During the study the major problem was how to collect the real information from the students, as they are studying in the same college. It is rather awkward for the students to explain the truth about the habit to the teacher. But this problem was overcome by the limitation. The institute finds out first the teachers who have the habit of tobacco chewing. But the institute asks them to encourage the students to explain reality about their habit. Then the student were relaxing to the point when the teaching themselves introduction as the habituated with the same habit of students. This affect positively and the response was really amazing. Limitation of the study total 181 student were examined during the study. Actually all the students of the all the colleges should be tested for their purpose, but it was not possible due to the large number of students and limitation of other resources also.

Action plan

- 1) Vidyabharti will start tobacco control awareness campaign for all college student of the area.
- 2) The organization will arrange essay writing competitive, debate competition, poster competition on college level to promote the massage of harmful effects of tobacco.
- The organ will arrange seminars, workshop.
- 4) The organization will submit this report to the health and education priority for highlighting the current status of tobacco use in the college level.
- 5) On the basis of this report the organization will request the government to ban the all products of tobacco.



Guidelines of Grievance Redressal Cell:

Objectives:

The Grievance Redressal Cell shall look into the grievance of the employees and students and take appropriate measures to redress them. The employees (teaching and non-teaching staff) and students shall approach the Cell to redress any grievance they face in their day to day interaction with the persons, bodies and authorities on the campus.

Organization:

- 1)The Cell consists of four members i.e., three teaching staff members, one non-teaching staff member and it is constituted every academic year.
- 2)the member of Cell nominated by the Principal.
- 3)one among the members shall act as its Coordinator.
- 4) The Coordinator shall maintain all the records and proceedings of the Cell.
- 5) The quorum of the meeting shall be four.

Powers and Functions:

- 1)The Cell shall attend a written petition or complaint as early as possible, but not later than seven days.
- 2) Once the petition or complaint is recorded, the Coordinator are a member of the Cell deputed by him shall make preliminary enquiry and resort to amicable means to redress the grievance. If the initial attempts to solve the problem became unfruitful, the meeting of the Cell shall be convened to initiate appropriate steps to redress the grievance.
- The members of the Cell shall interact with persons, bodies and authorities who are entitled to redress the grievance.
- 4)The Cell can forward suggestions to the staff council and other authorities on matters that come before it.

Limitations:

1) The Cell has no punitive powers.

It shall not entertain issues that require disciplinary action

ii)Second Calss - Two among life membes.

Third Class - Three among general members.

Election will be conducted with secret voting process.

9)Function of the Exicutive body :-

a)1/3 or members of executive body should remain persense for executive body's work.

b)Meeting of executive body will be called once in every three months.

c)Any member who remains absent for serially three meeting will be liable for cancellation of Memberships.

10)Rights of Executive Body:

a To observe the functions of various institutions.

b)To prepare laws for various institutions.

c)To superwise the financial budget of various institutions and to grant it.

d)To appoint, Terminate and sanction the resignation of the employees of various institutions.

e)To sanction the long term leaves of the employees.

f)To apply for new school, class or needed social institutions.

g)To take indesciplenary action and cancel the memberships of any member.

h)To prepare the budget of institution.

f)To work for financial planning of the institution.

11)President:

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- President will be selscted after every five years.
- President will superwise the school functions.
- He will sanction the one month leave of teachers and other employees.
- 4. If needed he can terminate the servives of misbehaved employees.
- 5. To call the meeting of Mahamandal and executive body.
- To maintain the meeting records.
- He can keep the advance deposit amount with him.

12) Vice- President:

He will work in absence of President.

Headmaster:

Headmaster will work as per the rule of M. S. Education Deptt. Under guidance of President and Secretory.

Financial Functions:

Earned amount will be deposited in bank with the resolution of the body.

Amount can be with drawn with the rules made by executive body.

Financial Yearly budget will be sanctioned by Executive body.

About Stable Property:

Sale and purchase power for stable property of the institution is allowed to the President. Property will be noted with the name of the institution and ont of the President.

If this property is to be sold the president should seek the permission of executive body and charity commission or Government.

President can apply for the new institutions, but he should get it sanctioned in the meeting of executive body after a month.

Director or Manager:

If needed Dandkaranya Educational and Cultural Development Research Institute can appoint a Director or Manager.

Director or Manager will get a Payment from the body as per the of Rs. 300 to 500.

Rights of the President are given to the Director or manager in written.

Voting powers are allotted to the Director or Manager.

Change or Improvement in Bylaws:

Change or Improvement in Bylaws can be done with the permission of 2/5 members of the executive body or with the application of 1/2 of the members of the institution. This should be sanctioned by 1/4 of the members of Mahamandal.

THE VISIT REPORT OF UNIVERSITY COMMITTEE

Nagpur University had constituted the following committee to consider the application of Vidya Bharti Mahavidyalaya, Kurkheda. District Gadchiroli for permanent affiliation and to make suitable recommendation to the Board of College and University Development and the Academic Council on verifications of the relevant information and details.

2] The Committee visited the college on the 24th March 2003 at 10.00am to scrutinize and verify the information contained in the application. The Committee was received by the Principal of the College Shri R.6. Munghate and the President of Dandkarayana Shaikshinik Sanskrutik Vikas Sanshodhan Sanstha Gadchiroli, which runs this college.

Through its application dated 31.08.2002, the college had sought permanent affiliation to degree programme in Arts faculty with the subjects (i) Compulsory English (ii) Compulsory Marathi (iii) Economics, (iv) Sociology (v) History and (vi) Marathi Literature.

3] Observations of the Committee

Vidya Bharti Mahavidyalaya, Kurkheda was established on 25.07.90 by the Dandkarayana Shaikshnik Sanskrutik Vikas Sanshodham Sanstha, Gadchiroli, is one of the reputed educational societies in this backward tribal area of Gadchiroli district running several education institutions at different levels thereby providing valuable service to the society was given the Best Institute Award by the Govt. of Maharashtra in the year 2000. Within a short span of about 13 years this college has emerged as an important academic centre in

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this backward region. Beside its academic performance, the college has also undertaken different projects by way of extension activities and has been providing services to the society at large. The college runs the Health Research Project approved by the Tata Institute of Social Mumbai. The topic of the research is the habit of tobacco chewing among college studies and its effect on their oral health. The College is also running another project of National Environment Awareness Campaign with the collaboration of Ministry of Forest and Environment (Govt. of India) for the last 3 years with the help of the college students and members of the staff.

3 | Physical Facilities

) Land

As per the stipulation in the norms for permanent affiliation prescribed by the University, 2 acres of developed land is available with the college. The land is already non-agricultural land as approved by the Competent Authority and the land title in proforma. 7/12 and 'C' sheet have been enclosed with the application. The work of fencing of the land has been in progress and is expected to be completed very soon.

ii) Play Ground

The college has developed play-ground for the games of Cricket, Kabbadi and Kho-kho and they are according to the required specifications.

iii) Building

The College has building accommodation to suffice for the present requirements of the college. The building has one Principal's room, rooms for the administrative staff as well as the staff room, one room for the library with reading room for the students. There is also a girls' ladies common room, games and sports room, N.S.S. room, laboratory and five class rooms of 900 sq.ft. each. The Board of College and University Development had written to the college on 12.11.2002 pointing out the total short fall of 2050 sq.ft. in academic and administrative space. This short fall has been removed by the college by providing the additional required space. The building plan has also now been submitted to the B.C.U.D. and this Committee.

iv) Furniture

The College does have required amount of furniture in the form of desks, benches, chairs, almirah, etc. The Office of the college is also well furnished with typewriter, fans, fixtures and two computer sets.

v) Drinking Water and other amenities:

Drinking water facilities have been separately provided for the students as well as the teaching and non-teaching staff. The college has a separate well which ensures regular availability of water. However, it would be desirable if the college installs filter machine to ensure safe and potable drinking water to the students as well as the staff. The separate toilet facilities are provided for the teaching and non-teaching staff. Construction of the toilet for the students is in progress and is expected to be completed soon.

Academic Requirement

i) Principal

The College has appointed Shri R.G. Munghate as the regular Principal of the college and he has been working as the Principal since 1.3.1999.

ii) Teaching Staff

The College has appointed regular teaching staff for various subjects. However there are a few vacancies of the teaching staff which could not be filled in because of the lack of permission from the Govt. The college has submitted to the Committee communication through which the matter is being earnestly pursued with the Govt. by the College. The College has also appointed a duly qualified Librarian and the Director of Physical Education. The teachers of the college are encouraged and regularly sponsored for their participation in academic activities like seminars, symposia, orientation and refresher courses. All the teachers have been confirmed in their respective position.

iii) Non-teaching Staff

The appointment of non-teaching staff has been made as per the staffing pattern prescribed by the Standard Code of 1984 and there is no vacancy in the non-teaching staff. The staff members are confirmed in their respective position and have been provided the facility of Provident Fund and Pension scheme.

iv) Library

The College library has 2960 titles costing Rs. 2,90,000/-. The library also subscribes to periodicals like 'India Today' and 'Down to Earth' and reputed dailies of State and National level are also made available to the students. However, it would be desirable if the college goes for atleast a couple of research journals. The Library should also be systematically modernised, developed and enriched.

v) Examinations Results

The performance of the students of the college at the University examination is fairly good as compared to the University results with a few exceptions.

vi) Academic Contribution

The College has an active unit of N.S.S. which not only performs the usual programmes of the University, but other activities like N.M. programmes supported by the Forcal and Environment Ministry of Government are also conducted. In sports and games activities, the participation of the students is quite encouraging. The students do participate in various competitive events organised by the University. The teachers are also involved in both these activities.

vii) Financial Standards

The G.P.F. contribution of the staff members are regularly deducted and deposited with the competent authority. The animum of scholarship is utilised properly and tuition fees is regularly deposited in the salary account. The College has deposited Rs. 75000/- in the Reserve Fund. No amount has been deposited in the building fund since the college has developed its own building. The various fees collected from the students on behalf of the University have been deposited with the University. The

college has regular and proper system of maintenance of financial accounts.

viii) Administrative Standards

The College has complied with the requirements of the Local Managing Committee as per Section 85(I) of the Maharashtra Universities Act, 1994. The Committee functions well having its regular meeting periodically. The College has also formed the College Development Council to monitor the overall development of the College. The Service Books and personal files of the employees are well maintained and updated from time to time.

ix) Other conditions

Other conditions mentioned in the University norms for granting permanent affiliation are by and large fulfilled by the college. The University/ Government orders issued from time to time are also faithfully observed. The deficiencies pointed out by the B.C.U.D. have been removed by the College by making sufficient provision. The conditions stipulated by the previous Local Enquiry Committee Report have also been satisfactorily complied with.

x) Meeting with the members of the teaching and Non-teaching staff:

The Committee had meetings with the members of the teaching and non-teaching staff separately and sought to know their views on the proposal of the college for permanent affiliation. There were no grievances from the members of the staff at the College level and they expressed happiness over working conditions. The Committee had extensive interaction with the Principal of the College besides holding discussion with the Chairman of the Society Shri G.N. Munghate who was particularly present on the day of the Committee's visit.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE COMMITTEE

Vidya Bharti Mahavidyalaya, Kurkheda, has emerged as one of the premier educational institutions in this remote and tribal district of Gadehiroli within a very short span and has the potential to develop into a major academic centre. It not only provides educational opportunities to the students but also makes available other opportunities for their development. In view of the above observations, the Committee recommends the grant of permanent affiliation to the following subjects and the course subject to compliance of the following conditions.
